QUEEN'S SCOUT PORTFOLIO OF EVIDENCE

The Victorian Venturer Scout Council provides the following as an example of the "minimum evidence" required to accompany the Venturer Scout Record Book when submitting the Queen's Scout Nomination for review.

The examples provided are used with the permission of the Venturers who provided them and attained their Queen's Scout. No judgement as to the standard and acceptability of the examples should be made without knowledge of these individual Venturers' skills, experience and circumstances which formed part of the Unit and District/Zone Councils considerations during their peer assessment.

Venturer Scouts are encouraged to review the evidence they have gathered on their Queen's Scout journey and provide a similar approach to this document with the necessary Certificates, Reports and other data to demonstrate their achievements.

Unit Council & District/Zone Council Minutes together with additional evidence may also be requested for review, but these are not required to be included as part of your folder.



Presenting Queen's Scout Award Completion

When a Venturer completes the requirements of the Queen's Scout Award (QSA) their Venturer Scout Commissioner-Regions (VSC-R) needs to review their work to ensure that the technical requirements of the award have been met. For this to occur each Venturer will need to provide the VSC-R their Venturer Record Book, completed QSA application form and portfolio of evidence (collection of documents and other items that expands upon the details in the Record book and provides proof of what the Venturer has undertaken).

This document is provided to provide guidance as to the expectations of the VSC-R and subsequently the District Commissioners (DC) for the final assessments towards a Venturer being awarded their Queen's Scout

The Venturer Scout Record Book

The Venturer Record Book is the primary document of both the requirements and proof of undertaking the Venturer Award Scheme which culminates with the Queen's Scout Award. Therefore it is important that the record book is fully completed with adequate detail to understand what a Venturer has done to meet the requirements of each section. After all this is where each examiner is signing their name to say the Venturer has met the requirements, and though despite the award scheme not being like money, lack of details in the record book would be like signing a blank cheque. Would you sign a blank cheque?

A preliminary review of a Venturer's record book should be undertaken by both Unit Leaders and District Venturer Leaders prior to completion of the QSA and then again before it goes to the VSC-R and DC. Below are some things to be looking for:

- All fields are completed from page 7 onwards where the section has been completed.
- All parts requiring signatures have a signature and relevant dates.
- Dates have been filled in and are correct and relevant. That they match minutes and other records.
- Where activities require certain time-frames that these have been meet eg Leadership, Pursuits etc.
- Examiner details have been completed in each area and especially on pages 121-126 of the record book and as per approvals by Unit Councils and Z/DVCs.
- Where activities need to be done in a specific order (eg Expeditions), care should be taken to ensure that this has occurred and is recorded correctly.

Really good practice for record books is that they are completed as activities are proposed and completed, there is nothing worse than chasing an examiner three years after having completed a badge to get their signature.

The Portfolio of Evidence

It is not expected that a Venturer will provide their version of War and Peace to support their Queen's Scout application, it could be as simple as 30 pages or sleeves of information and is expected to be not more than one folder containing 150 pages or sleeves of information.

The following tables provide a guide as to the evidence that could (where there is no defined reporting requirement in the Venturer Record book) and what <u>must</u> (where the Venturer Record book specifies a written report) be included in a portfolio of evidence for activities undertaken in completing the activity requirements.

Where the Venturer Record book doesn't contain a specified requirement there is no need to specifically create a report or other item, in this case just provide what you have found, collected, produced, used or been given whilst completing the activity and proving yourself to your examiner and or unit.

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If you want some brownie points then presenting it in the order of the record is really appreciated by VSC-Rs!



VA Expedition – Great Ocean Walk

On my expedition on the Great Ocean walk between Johanna Beach and Blanket Bay we all had an amazing time. We got to implement various skills along the way and admire amazing views throughout the hike.

We used various Scout craft and leadership skills throughout the two days including navigational skills using maps and compasses for the entire hike. The leadership roles on the hike were shared between myself and Ethan as we took in turns to navigate and lead the way, making some decisions as we went.

The weather on our hike was very good throughout most of the weekend. On the first day it was around 25 degrees and was clear for most of the day until the evening when it started to spit a bit, which continued overnight. In the morning of the second day it was slightly colder, around 20 degrees and was clear for the beginning of the day's hike. When we made it up to the top of the cliff however, it became very windy and began to rain. This continued on and off for the rest of the day. Just after we finished the hike the temperature dropped even further to about 12 degrees and it started to rain even more. Overall the weather for our hike was pretty good.

While on the track we were almost constantly surrounded by plants and flora. On the first day we walked through a lot of shrubs and bushes for the majority of the day but in the afternoon there quite a few sections with large trees and different grasses as well. On the second day we started out walking through a lot of trees and larger bushes but as we got further up the trees gradually got smaller and more and more grasses started appearing. As we got towards the end the flora became more like the beginning, trees and bushes again.

There was quite a bit of fauna on our hike as well. The first day we walked past a lot of cows and sheep in paddocks along the road into the camp and also saw some kangaroos. While at the campsite in the evening there were some koalas exploring around near our tents and the trees above it. We also went for a small walk down to the river and saw a lot of fish and frogs too. On the second day of hiking we saw an echidna and a snake near the trail and some lizards on the rocks nearby. There were also a huge amount of birds around us for the entire hike.

The track that we were walking on was mainly a dirt track as well as a lot of sand and rocks. Around us was a lot of plants, rocks and sand and while we were walking along the beach there was a lot of water too.

The only environmental issue the stood out to me along the way was the spread of cinnamon fungus. To protect against this there was boot cleaning stations to clean the fungus off our boots. Here we had to uses special brushed to get the initial fungus off and then wash our boots in soapy water before using the brushes again. The only fault in strategy however is the some people don't use them and there often isn't any soapy water in there so it isn't effective. There were also board walked along parts of the trail to stop the spread of the cinnamon fungus as well.

I believe that we have done a pretty good job with our expedition. Ethan and I planned the entire thing, discussed our plans with our examiner and the group members and then did a preparation day with a small day hike as one of our group members hadn't hiked before. We then followed through with our plans. We completed the hike well with only a few minor complications including an unwell party member. We still got everyone through the whole hike and everyone felt the joy of accomplishment as we finished.

Environmental course held at Harkaway Scout Camp

INTRODUCTION:

The Harkaway Scout Camp is a biodiverse area of bushland located south east of Melbourne. The area is well known locally for its flora and fauna, and as a result it is well maintained by the scouts as well as the local council in order to preserve its beauty.

What you did:

Over a weekend in May 2016, from Friday 27th to Sunday 29th I participated in an organised Environmental Course held at Harkaway. Over the three days, I participated in serious discussion about environmental sustainability, including the need for clean and regulated waterways, the clearing of bushland through practises such as manual work and controlled fire burns to reduce the buildup of substance which would act as fuel in a fire, intensifying the harm done to animals and the local environment, as well as the benefits of this practise to the soil of the park. As well as this, we ourselves dug gutters to assist with water run off to maintain the surrounding paths and allow the creek to function properly. Furthermore, I assisted with the fixing of the hall's septic tank system, in order to dispose of the waste in an environmentally friendly method. However, our main task was to clear pathways and patches of bushland in preparation for a regulated "burn" to diminish build of natural fuels such as bark, leaves and branches, as well as promote future growth. Furthermore, we collected rubbish, including tyres and litter from the park.

Why you did it:

In order to minimise bushfire impact, the CFA is expected to clear 5% of bushland annually to reduce build up of fuels. This is a regulated practise, in which the fire is controlled both in the area it covers as well as the heat it reaches. This practise not only reduces the impact of potential future fires, but stimulates the soil and therefore allows for more sufficient habitats in which plants may prosper or animals migrate too.

Elements fulfilled through this task:

- "improving the number of sufficient natural habitats which exist to support native species"
- "preparing to respond to environmental hazards and natural disasters"

The work undertaken on the septic system was necessary in order to establish a waste removal system which would allow for human inhabitants to attend the area without harming the environment with their own waste. Also, the management is necessary to the safety of the local flora and fauna, as it reduces the harmful substances which may impact soil or waterways, as well as the air source due to gas production.

Reduction of waste was also noted as we collected various materials which would otherwise pollute the area, and harm local fauna if consumed, including everything from general litter to tyres.

Elements fulfilled through this task:

- "sources of clean water and clean air in the local environment"
- "minimising the risk of harmful substances to support native species"

We also dug gutters along the road throughout the path to assist with water flow following rain. This would preserve the paths for future use, and minimise the destruction of the landscape which could occur if the water couldn't run into to creek or be evaporated, instead saturating the ground. This also assisted in the health of the creek.

Elements fulfilled through this task:

Friday the 4th of March 2016, our venturer unit went on a road trip to Nathalia to visit the Barmah Forest Heritage and Education Centre where we researched some of Australia's local Indigenous history as well as the rest of the Barmah Forest's history.

The Barmah Forest is the largest natural plantation of Red Gums in the world and therefore attracts hundreds of tourists on a weekly basis including schools from as far away as Melbourne.

The first thing we did was watch a summating film that gave us a rough idea of what we were going to see and learn about the Barmah environment and the gradual colonisation of Europeans. Next the tour guide escorted us around the centre where she described each of the sections, such as transportation using the river or industries taking up in the Barmah forest, and gave a brief explanation of them.

Following our tour of the two story building we were each handed a quiz sheet to which we would find the answers to by searching the entire centre and reading specific monuments and posters. Everybody's quiz was different but questions included things like, "what is the only industry still occupied in the Barmah Forest?" or "When did the Barmah Forest become a National Park?". I was the only one in this activity that did not have a partner and I believe this is why I lost.

I found the whole experience very interesting and have since been back to finish exploring and learning of the Barmah Forest's History.

In relation to the Indigenous history I learnt that the local tribe based in the Barmah Forest is called the Yorta Yorta tribe and has slowly been pushed away from their home because of white people. This has happened both first hand and because our influence on the environment has meant that the Yorta Yorta people cannot sustain life there anymore.

Following this venturer activity I researched the Scouting movement's involvement with Australia's Indigenous and what I found was this: In the 1990's the Scouting in Indigenous Communities Program was established.

The objectives of the Scouting in Indigenous Communities Program have been developed in relation to the specific cultural needs of Indigenous young people and their communities. The program aims to:

- encourage young people to actively participate in the development of their communities with recognition and respect for the dignity of other people and for the preservation of the environment;
- provide opportunities for young Indigenous people to develop personal and group relationships by enhancing their emotional and social well-being;
- provide the opportunity to develop strong cross-generational links with older community members through a range of traditional cultural activities;
- provide challenging and appealing activities for Indigenous Scouting participants designed to build self-determination and meaningful life opportunities;
- develop a sense of achievement and belonging among young people within their communities;
- encourage cross-cultural exchanges that will enhance the reconciliation process;
- learn by doing
- stimulate the search for knowledge and encourage active participation in education; and
- provide a wide range of attractive, constructive and challenging outdoor adventures, exploration activities and fun

County Court of Victoria Open Day Report

On 21 May, 2106, I visited the Country Court of Victoria and attended mocking hear of culpable driving and some behind the sense tour.

From the open day, I learned that culpable driving is driving causes death and this type of cases are heard in County Court mostly. Judges normally take half days to hear the case which includes medical reports, witnessers, rebuttal between lawyers and all sort of things in order to make the fairest decision. Culpable driving is a serious offence, it is an individual crime. It could have maximum 20 years in prison. There would be 20 to 30 per cent discount of the sentence if the person plead the guilty earlier, no repeat offence record previously. Plead guilty earlier shows a person's responsibility and the judge on the day suggests If you plead guilty to a criminal offence (charge) earlier, the discount will be bigger. Culpable is a criminal offence to those who drive causes death other people, even you drive causes death of your





family member, you would receive the charge. The judge on the day shares as a case she experienced before: in one family, one son drove and caused death of the other son, on the day on the court, the parent sitting at the back were devastated as one of the son died and the other were going to be in prison. That is a hard case for the judge too. Driving causes injury would be an other charge.

With some behind the sense tour, I visited the area only for jury, criminal courts, civil courts,

the prison cell under the building. It is very interesting to tour around the County Court and I learned lot from it.

Electoral Procedures

- Commonwealth Electoral Procedures is intended as a guide to the federal electoral system. It
 closely follows both the structure and language of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 but
 should not be read as a replacement for the legislation which governs our electoral process.
- Compulsory voting was introduced at federal elections in 1924 and remains in force today.
- The Australian electorate has experienced three types of voting system First Past the Post, Preferential Voting and Proportional Representation (Single Transferable Vote).
- Today, two variants of Preferential Voting and two variants of Proportional Representation are used for all Australian parliamentary elections. This paper has two primary concerns: firstly, explaining in detail the way each operates, the nature of the ballot paper and how the votes are counted; and secondly, the political consequences of the use of each system.
- Under <u>Full Preferential Voting</u> each candidate must be given a preference by the voter. This system favours the major parties; can sometimes award an election to the party that wins fewer votes than its major opponent; usually awards the party with the largest number of votes a disproportionate number of seats; and occasionally gives benefits to the parties that manufacture a three-cornered contest in a particular seat.
- With <u>Optional Preferential Voting</u> the voter may allocate preferences to as few as one candidate. This system can produce similar outcomes to full Preferential Voting, but can also produce results where the winning candidate wins with less than half of the votes. It also clearly lessens the importance of preferences in many seats.
- The <u>Proportional Representation system</u> used in Senate elections increases the chances of minor parties and independents winning seats, produces closer results in the struggle between the major parties, and makes it difficult for a major party to gain control of the Senate.
- The <u>Hare-Clark system</u> ensures that no seat is safe, creates an electoral system where party
 members fight each other as much as their external opponents, and operates in such a way that
 minority governments are more common than when Preferential Voting is used.
- The system of preferential voting is a notable feature of the Australian political system. (Full Preferential Voting)
- Most similar political systems employ the Simple Majority (First-Past-The-Post) system or some form of proportional representation.
- Preferential voting is employed in elections for the House of Representatives and all State lower houses in Australia, apart from the Tasmanian House of Assembly and the A.C.T. Legislative Assembly.
- 1. voters are required to place the number "1" against the candidate of their choice, known as their first preference.
- 2. voters are then required to place the numbers "2", "3", etc., against the other candidates listed on the ballot paper in order of preference.
- 3. the counting of first preference votes, also known as the primary vote, takes place first. If no candidate secures an absolute majority 50% plus 1 of primary votes, then the candidate with the least number of votes is "eliminated" from the count.

- 4. the ballot papers of the eliminated candidate are examined and re-allocated amongst the remaining candidates according to the number "2", or second preference votes.
- 5. if no candidate has yet secured an absolute majority of the vote, then the next candidate with the least number of primary votes is eliminated. This preference allocation continues until there is a candidate with an absolute majority. Where a second preference is expressed for a candidate who has already been eliminated, the voter's third or subsequent preferences are used.

UNIT MANAGEMENT (Section 2) – Alpine Shire –

The Alpine Shire is the local level government for the areas encompassing the three major towns of Bright, Myrtleford and Mount Beauty and smaller surrounding towns such as Tawonga, Porepunkah, Ovens, Dinner Plain, Harrietville, Rosewhite, Wandiligong, Freeburgh, Smoko and Hotham Heights. Its aim and principles are stated and followed by the Alpine Shire Council's Vision and Council's Mission.

Council's Vision

The Alpine Shire provides outstanding opportunities for its residents and visitors through sustainable growth in balance with the natural environment.

Council's Mission

The Alpine Shire will:

Provide leadership and representation

Foster community spirit through community cohesion and participation

Encourage best value, customer focused services

Facilitate sustainable growth and development

Provide an accessible and accountable system of government.

The vision and mission talk about the key points in the shire which Council will work on developing into the future to make the shire the best it can be.

The objectives of the shire are stated in a key document of the shire, the Alpine Shire 2030 Community Vision. This document outlines the key directions the Council wishes to take the Shire forward in. These are our natural environment, balanced development, economic prosperity, identity and character of communities, services and facilities, links between communities and enhancing our strong and safe communities. This document was first drafted in 2005/2006 and was reviewed in 2010. On top of this, every new Council is required to deliver a 4-year Council Plan spanning their term as a Councillor which outlines each of the Council's directions and commitments to our communities, with the current one ranging from 2013-2017.

Because the Council is elected by the people of the Alpine Shire, and the CEO, who manages staff and the overall functioning of the Shire is chosen by Council, the entire organisation is accountable to the residents who elected them. Because the majority of Council's funding is sourced through rates for the provision of services to local communities, accountability to the people is at the forefront of how the Alpine Shire functions. This is why Council is so concerned with ensuring it communicates with residents effectively and includes them in making decisions that impact them. Council provides services ranging from maternal and child health services and vaccinations to Home and Community Care for our aged residents; capital works such as new sporting and recreational facilities, roads and footpaths, tree management, waste and recycling services etc.

The structure of the Alpine Shire is similar to a hierarchy system. At the bottom are Officers, these range from titles such as Youth Development, Media, Tourism and more. These Officers report to Managers, who look after areas such as Community Services, Economic Development, Project Delivery and more. Managers then report to Directors, who cover three areas, one each. These are Sustainable Development (Heather Green), Corporate and Community (Trevor Britten) and Infrastructure Services (Ian Ellett). These three directors report to the Senior Council and the CEO. The Senior Council is made up of 7 Councillors from all across the shire, from Tawonga to Buffalo River. The councillors, one elected every four years, nominate and vote for the positions of Mayor

and Deputy Mayor, whom are currently Peter Roper and Jan Vonarx each in their respective roles. The newly appointed CEO as of October 2013 is Dave Barry, who replaced Ian Nicholls.

Council elections are every four years, the next one being 2016, and all positions held by councillors are up for nomination. All Alpine Shire residents aged 18 and over are required to vote in this election. The voting is done through a preference based voting system.

The Alpine Shire receives it's funding in two major ways. Two thirds of their annual budget is received from rates paid by households in the Shire, and the other third from the Victorian State Government.

The Council works on many major projects and issues all the time, recent ones include the Bright to Harrietville Shared Trail, Bright Riverside Play Area, Mt Beauty Foreshore Project, better flood systems in Myrtleford and the trial closure of Martley Street in Porepunkah.

There is also an Alpine Shire Youth Council, which was originally formed in 2001, who works closely with the Senior Council on giving a youth view and opinion on local issues and projects, as well as work with the Youth Development Officer on running programs and events for local youth through FReeZA. These include the North East Skate Park Series, Battle of the Bands, Youth Week, Youth Awards, workshops and numerous other events held throughout the year for 12-25 year olds.



After several preliminary phone calls and emails, I called Kerry McQualter of the NAB Bank to fulfil the requirements of aspect 4 of my VA Vocations.

Kerry is the Agribusiness Manager of the section of NAB Shepparton which specialises with the finances of farming industries and individuals.

Kerry had sent me an email briefly explaining most of the elements I needed to deepen my understanding of, which we then elaborated upon over the phone. The emails exchanged are attached.

I learnt many things through this interview, both in regards to the general banking system as well as that of NAB. The following is a summary of my findings in regards to that necessary in regards to the Scout Records Book.

4a) Contact a financial institution and evaluate the types of accounts available and their method of operation (eg. Loans, cheque, savings, credit facilities) and record keeping.

Cheque/Savings: My basic understanding of accounts prior to this activity was limited to that of "Cheque, savings and credit" and the assumption that something would also be available to major business accounts. I learnt that the cheque account is fairly outdated, with Kerry estimated that only 20% (approximately) of the banks customers still use cheques, presumably as a result of the introduction of online banking. As a result of this, most customers merge their cheque and savings accounts for convenience.

Credit Credit accounts are popular for customers for necessity, convenience and the perks which are available. For example, frequent flyer points are associated with credit accounts, as are equivalent schemes including flybys.

Loans: Customers will borrow a certain amount to be paid off in a set time frame, with the money borrowed accumulating interest accordingly. The interest rates and timeframes of loans will vary on the needs of the customer. Therefore, different types of loans are available to those who are trying to buy a house, in comparison with those purchasing a used car. Kerry explained this simply and clearly in her email, as attached

Record Keeping: Interestingly, the NAB Bank is now predominantly paperless. 99% of the files are instead stored on a digital data base. Papers are scanned and uploaded before being destroyed. This works for convenience in the management and storage of the data, which is securely protected through passwords and codes.

Following my call to Kerry on 18/04/2016, I called Matt Van der Burg to fulfil the other requirements of the Vocations badge.

4b) Contact the credit office of a major retailer and determine the information required to be accepted as a credit customer and the additional costs to the customer compared with cash purchase.

Matt Van der Burg is a previous employee of Murray Goulburn Trading, a company situated in Cobram dealing with farming supplies. Through his position, Matt is well acquainted with the financial management of a large scale retailer and able to offer insight to its administration.

Due to the value of the equipment and services offered by Murray Goulburn Trading, **to be accepted as a credit customer**, customers are asked to present a financial statement, certified by an accountant. Otherwise, the contact details of their personal account can be supplied and they can be contacted directly. This is necessary due to the large scale operation of the business, in order to not jeopardise the profits of its trading.

According to Matt, there are no additional costs to the customer from Murray Goulburn Trading itself, when compared with cash purchase, and no registration fees. However, their own banking will deal with their credit accounts accordingly.

4c) Investigate lay-bys, term payments, mortgages, leasing, hire purchase, use of personal credit cards and all associated costs eg. Management fees, discounts, interest payments.

Lay-bys: A lay-by is offered from some retail stores, in which a deposit is paid on a certain item, and then paid for upon collection. In either two or three instalments, the customer is able to purchase the item and then take it home, but still secure it before being able to buy it outright.

Term payments: As I discussed with Kerry, a term payment is the payment made per a given period of time to either pay off a loan from a bank or to accept your own money from an investment. Accordingly, term payments generate interest. Depending on the amount of interest and the payment made, the balance of the loan/investment may increase in value, decrease in value or remain the same.

Use of personal credit cards and all associated costs: Credit cards are associated with credit accounts from which customers can access (and later repay) more money than is in their current balance. Credit facilities carry the cost of interest, which varies according to the

debt, the bank and the account. Discounts can be awarded to credit card uses through the associated use of "flybys" or "frequent flyer" points.

Mortgages: A mortgage is an agreement between a financial institution and an individual, usually relating to houses. Simply, the property or goods are purchased by a loan, which is paid back to the financial institution in instalments with interest. However, the property is under the title of the financial institution, and only becomes the property of the individual after the final payment of their mortgage.

Leasing: A lease relates to a contracted agreement in which one party conveys property or equipment to another for a specified time frame. During this time, periodic payments will be made in exchange for the goods used. While an individual is leasing goods, the ownership of the object lies with the leaser

Hire Purchase: Hire purchase is a system in which an individual pays for goods in regular instalments, and during this time is able to maintain the use of the object. Unlike a lease however, they do not maintain ownership of the goods/property until after the last payment is made.

Use of personal credit cards and all associated costs: Credit cards, as in my report with Kerri, offer an individual access to their credit accounts. However, as credit relies on money which an individual is not always currently in possession of, it carries added costs such as interest.

- -Management fees: Bank members are required to be a fee for the services of the bank. This is generally an annual payment and allows the individual to be a member of the bank, and for the bank to handle their finances.
- -Discounts: Credit cards often have a certain appeal as they can entail discounts such as FlyBys. Use of credit cards have these benefits which can be traded for other goods and services, and often form a loyalty to the financial institution and the credit account.
- -Interest payments: For most loans or investments, interest is accumulated in wither simple or compound form. This is how most banks make their money, as when customers borrow money for their credit accounts, they are obligated to pay this back, as well as interest upon it. The higher the interest rate, the bigger the original loan, and the more often it compounds, the more interest an individual will have to pay.

I received the following email from Kerry prior to our phone conversation to provide a basis for our discussion.

The scope of the question covers a very broad product base.

The NAB overs an extensive range of accounts

To summarise the basic products available

Personal accounts

Classic banking- transaction account, no fees, accessed by card, atm cheque book, and internet banking. Paper or online statements

Investment accounts ie I saver – daily interest , variable interest rate , no fees, daily access- internet banking access

Term deposit- fixed term, fixed interest, limited early access- must give 30 days notice, no fees- can view on internet banking but need to come into a branch to deposit and withdraw

Personal credit cards- for general living costs, high interest rates charged if not fully repaid each month

Big Brothers Big Sisters Australia

Big Brothers Big Sisters Australia is an organisation that helps young people aged 7-17 years old who have little opportunity to develop positive relationships by pairing them up with volunteer mentors.

Big Brothers Big Sisters supports disadvantaged children including:

- Children living in low income households who deal with the cycle of unemployment and poverty
- Children whose parents have psychiatric illnesses, intellectual disabilities or addictions
- Children exposed to family violence or child abuse
- Children with poor social skills who have a hard time making friends and/or experience bullying
- Children with learning disabilities at school or display behavioural concerns
- Children experiencing family breakdowns
- · Children living with single or homosexual parents
- Children in foster care or residential care situations
- Children with intellectual disabilities

These children are referred to Big Brothers Big Sisters by parents, grandparents, schools, youth and family support agencies, foster care agencies, child protection services or disability programs.

After referral kids are then matched up to a volunteer mentor with similar interests and personality traits. After being paired up, a first meeting is organised and the kids and mentor then begin to get to know each other.

What the kids do with their mentor is ultimately up to them, but common activities are:

- Walks
- · Going to the park
- Cooking
- Kicking the footy
- · Bike rides
- Board games
- Craft

Big Brothers Big Sisters had three main programs that they offer, all of which have the same basis, to pair a young person up with a mentor to provide the support and positive role model that they require through community, school and web based problems.

The community based program is their primary program which pairs a young person with a child where they meet around once a week usually for between one and three years for the formal program however these mentor partnerships usually last for a lot longer after the program finishes. This program is aimed at providing children with a positive relationships.

Big Brothers Big Sisters also has an online mentoring program called Our Space. Our Space offers mentoring and support with the same principles of the community based program, giving children who live in remote areas the chance to receive the same support as those living in suburban areas. Online support programs can also provide support to children who can't participate in the face to face mentoring due to chronic illness, unstable mental health, physical disabilities, exclusion/isolation due to religion or culture and/or anxiety disorders.

The main in school program that Big Brothers Big Sisters run is Big Futures. Students in Years 8-12 are referred to the program by the school's wellbeing staff or teachers. The mentors then meet up with students at the school, during school hours for one to two hours per week for either a term or a whole school year. This program is aimed at providing young people with the support and encouragement to take full advantage of what the school offers and develop positive pathways for the future after school. Mentors in the Big Futures program also play a role in keeping students at risk of dropping out or failing in school.

Big Brothers Big Sisters has had programs running internationally for the past 110 years and in Australia for the past 30 years.

The current national office for Australia is in St Kilda with mentoring hubs in Inner Western Melbourne, Geelong, Ballarat and Queensland and program partnerships in Adelaide, Sydney, a Jewish mentoring partnership also in Sydney as well as the online Our Space available Australia wide.

Big Brothers Big Sisters has a board of 10 directors with a chair and a deputy chair who run the organisation. Underneath them is the senior leadership team with four representatives; the chief executive officer, business development officer, operations officer and the quality and training officer. There is then a team of staff at each mentoring hub who support the volunteer mentors.

The Big Brothers Big Sisters program has had positive results in the lives of many children around Australia.

Proven outcomes of the program include:

- Educational success
- · Avoidance of risky behaviours
- · Higher aspirations for the future
- · Greater confidence and self esteem
- Better relationships with peers and adults in their lives
- School retention
- School and community safety
- · Greater employment pathways
- Participants more likely to give to charitable causes and volunteer

In the program 90% of mentors saw a positive change in the young people they were mentoring, 88% of kids in the mentor program saw positive academic improvements and 64% of young people developed a higher self esteem and confidence, showing that the program is effective and serves it's purpose in the community.

Volunteers in Big Brothers Big Sisters programs are fully supported by the Big Brothers Big Sisters staff in order to provide a positive experience, not only for the young people but for the mentors as well.

The steps to become a volunteer mentor at Big Brothers Big Sisters are:

- · Submit an online application, registering your interest in becoming a mentor
- · An initial interview is carried out at the Big Brothers Big Sisters office
- Read through policies and security documents, check your documentation and nominate referees
- Complete a computer based psychological test at the Big Brothers Big Sisters office
- Police, working with children and referee checks are performed
- · A second interview is conducted at the Big Brothers Big Sisters office
- The Big Brothers Big Sisters staff conducts a home visit/check
- Complete online and face to face volunteer training
- You will be paired up with a compatible young person based on shared interest, personality and location
- Attend the first meeting with the child you'll be mentoring, which will be supervised
- Continue to meet with and support the child for as long as they require it

Volunteers in all of the Big Brothers Big Sisters programs are all supported mentoring coordinators on the staff who ensure that everyone is getting the most out of the programs and having fun at the same time.

VA Expressions

In early January, I was invited to attend a branch certified, two day "street art" course at Blender Studios. This course had 2 aims; firstly, it allowed participants to fulfil requirements for either VA Expressions or VA pursuits, while developing artistic skill, and secondly it allowed scouts to create artwork which would then be used in the upcoming Big Day Scout.

So, on the 7th of January 2015 I woke up at a stupid hour of the morning, in order to catch a bus from Katunga and then train from Shepparton, to arrive in Melbourne three hours later at 10am.

The course began at 10:30am, and According to Google maps, I could walk there and arrive with 8 minutes to spare. However, in true Google Maps fashion, this number was as accurate as lotto predications, and resulted in me asking various strangers for directions.

It turns out that the cause of the my Lostness resulted not from the inaccuracy of Google Maps, but that Blender Studios does not, in fact, have a front entrance, nor any signs to alert onlookers, such as myself, to its presence. After a phone call, I was met by one of the artists outside, and escorted in (only 10 minutes late).

I was one of about 15 attending venturers, and knew one other from my region, Madeline Crichton. We were seated around tables, sketching on stretches of Butcher's Paper as we made introductions to one another.

The day began with a tour of the studio, enlightening us to the various artists that work from Blender Studios, and the different medias which they produce; from photography to sculpture, graffiti art to "paste ups".

Artwork 1: Paste Up (11am-3pm, 4hours)

A Paste Up was to be the first art form our small group would create. This art form is achieved by taking a printed piece of paper and adhering it to a wall with the use of a paste. This paste can be made from cornflour and water, or from a watered down PVC glue solution.

We wanted our creation to be semi-permanent, withstanding any potential weather that may damage between that time and the upcoming scavenger hunt. For that reason, PVC glue solution was opted for.

We were each called into a separate room to have our photos taken. We were asked for "action shots" to depict what it means to be a scout. We were also given a box of props to use, including balls, rope, a flag, kayaking paddles and other paraphernalia. I simply chose to run across the backdrop while my photo was snapped.

These photos were then printed, almost life size. We sat on the floor with our scissors, quietly snipping away at our four foot selves. I was one of the last to finish, as I regretted my decision to not tie back my hair, and trimming between strands proved to be both time-consuming and fussy.

After FINALLY succeeding, we mixed our paste, and tripped down to a nearby alley to stick up our art. The wall belonged to a mechanic company, who were open to the idea or us decorating the otherwise blank wall with our mural.

The business was sloppy and sticky, but quite fun. The overall result being a crowd of scouts, running across the wall. In Big Day Scout, this was to be a checkpoint for scavenger hunters who would snap a photo in front of it before proceeding to their next point.

In the following picture, I can be seen in the centre (wearing a grey shirt and blue skirt) in front of our mural, alongside all other venturers who participated in its creation.





Artwork 2: Collage (30 minutes)

We regrouped the following day to continue our course, beginning the day with a collage. We were given a selection of magazines, including old copies of Scouts Australia. This activity wasn't in order to create artwork to be used in Big Day Scout, but to encourage us all to create, and to inspire us for the upcoming activity. Using markers, cut-outs and glue as our only materials we created these simple pieces as a "warm-up" for the rest of the day.



Artwork 3: Stencilled Graffiti Art (10:30-12.37pm 2hours 37minutes)

This was to be our major project for the day. We began with a talk from one of Blender Studios' Artists which specialised in stencil art.

We each sketched our own designs; I chose to model my art off a sketch of a scout scarf. This sketch would have to be transferable to the thin plastic that would be our stencil, and not be overly complicated to avoid it breaking or blotching.



We traced our design onto the plastic sheeting, then (very carefully) used Stanley knives to remove components that would reveal our design after painting. This element proved to be the most complicated part of the process, but with care and precision I ultimately achieved a stencil I was happy with.

Following this, we took to the Studio's alleyway to test out our stencils. For safety reasons we were asked to wear masks to prevent us from inhaling the spray paint.

After experimenting with my stencil across various surfaces; the pavement, the bricks ect. And with various colours of paint I decided to create my final work using the colours of the Yullaba scarf, my

own home troop. On a square canvas, I started the base layer with a light blue paint, and then moved the stencil slightly to create a two-toned, striped effect with a matte black to evince the bands across the scarf. Finally, I opted to colour in the woggle with the black paint again for a more solid effect and add a "splattered" result around the edges of the canvas.

The canvases were then left to dry in the alley as we ate our lunches.

Hour Log

Time spent on artworks: 7hours 7minutes

-The combined time spent participating in the physical creation of our artwork over the course, including all three aspects: the collage, paste-up and stencil art.

Research and Planning: 2 hours

-Time spent being taught about various mediums undertaken by artists at Blender Studios and manners in which this art can be personalised or completed personally. Also time in which we toured the studios and nearby streets to witness "street art" throughout Melbourne to inspire us with our own work.

Clearing and cleaning: 30minutes (approximately)

-Time spent cleaning and clearing areas after producing art, in order to restore the workplace to its original state.

Placing Artwork: 1hour 20minutes

-Time spent installing artwork in various places throughout the city. After the conclusion of the workshop, several Venturers, myself including, and two Rovers took the artwork to the locations throughout the city where they would be displayed the next weekend. Then, we took pictures of the work, to remember this placement later, and then took them down again to avoid theft or damage. **Travel time:** 6 hours

-Time spent travelling to and from the course in Melbourne from my home in Katunga.

TOTAL TIME: 10hours 57minutes (+ 6 hours travel time)

Summary

This experience not only taught me about the various forms of street art that can be both found and made in Melbourne, but also encouraged me to create art in various forms- something I seem to do less and less over the years. Furthermore, the art we produced was beneficial to a wider cause, being a contribution to Big Day Scout. It was rewarding to have my work shown and used in this program, and to know that it was seen by hundreds of scouts across Australia in a fun activity based around art and Scouting in Melbourne's centre.

Venturer Award Lifestyles – Section 1

The use of tobacco, alcohol and drugs can have a detrimental effect on our bodies. This can cause harm to our physical and mental health. These drugs can affect everyone differently based on body type, amount taken and other substances in the system.

Tobacco, most commonly consumed by smoking in the form of cigarettes and cigars, releases the chemical nicotine along with many other poisons when smoked. The poisons found in these cigarette are also found in other products, such as methanol (rocket fuel), cadmium (batteries), and hexamine (barbeque lighter). Short term effects include a raised heartbeat, bad breath, dizziness and coughing. Long term effects after chronic use include loss of taste and smell, stomach ulcers, heart attack, stroke, various cancers and yellow fingernails. Giving up tobacco can be hard as it is addictive, with withdrawal symptoms featuring headaches, restless sleeping, cravings, anxiety and trouble concentrating. In terms of mental health, tobacco has been shown to increase anxiety and tension, as well as smoking rate in adults with depression being twice as high when compared with adults without depression.

Alcohol is a depressant (meaning it slows down the body) affects the body in many ways. Short term effects after some alcohol include slower reflexes, trouble concentrating and feeling relaxed. When a large amount of alcohol is in someone's system, these short term effects change to blurred vision, memory loss, nausea, vomiting and passing out. Effects of long term use of alcohol in large quantities includes regular colds and flus, depression, poor memory, liver disease, cancer, high blood pressure and heart disease. Alcohol can also cause people to behave impulsively and lose inhibitions, which may lead to some actions they might not have otherwise done, including self-harm and suicide.

Illicit drugs are illegal drugs such as cannabis, methamphetamine, cocaine and heroin. These drugs are made illegal by the government due to the effects they have on a person's actions and behaviours, including effects on a person's ability to drive safely. Cannabis and heroin is depressant which slows down the body's central nervous system, while ecstasy, ice and cocaine are stimulants which speed up the central nervous system. The central nervous system includes the brain and the spine. Long term effects of some popular illicit drugs include:

Cannabis – Memory loss, learning difficulties, mood swings, sore throat, reduced sex drive

Cocaine – Insomnia, exhaustion, depression, paranoia, psychosis, nose bleeds, eating disorders

Ecstasy – Colds and flus, depression, dependence on ecstasy, social problems

Ice – Restless sleep, muscle stiffness, anxiety, violence, heart and kidney problems, weight loss

Heroin – Intense sadness, constipation, damaged heart, lungs, liver and brain, vein damage

All in all, these substances all have negative impacts in the long term to a person's health, both physical and mental.

Venturer Award Lifestyles - Section 3

For this section, I decided to complete regular cross country running, with my examiner being former Olympian and teacher Bill Scott, who raced in the 10,000m at the 1980 Moscow Olympics. Bill provided great feedback and a great assessor for the challenge set for myself.

To improve my running, I participated regularly over various different tracks and courses. These included:

- Reservoir Course A measure 5km course used as a standard for timing, included a variety of challenging hills, steep descents and flat sections.
- Rail Trail Close to my house, easy and includes gradual inclines, usually ran towards Porepunkah or sometimes towards Wandiligong
- Canyon Walk A difficult run due to rocky terrain and stairs at time
- Cherry Walk Difficult to access easy as on other side of town, however features many undulating hills and shaded in many parts, various distances run.

On top of these tracks, I also participated in other training exercises as a part of my Year 12 Physical Education class which assisted. These included:

- The Beep Test I scored a 9.5, meaning I covered over 1500m in around 9 minutes before I was unable to keep up with the beeps. This session also included warm up exercises and an active recovery following.
- Fartlek Training Focussing on speed play, this included rotations of various durations and running intensities including jogging, 3/4 pace, sprinting, walking and running backwards. This is used to test heart rate changes as it was very strenuous on the body to be changing so often. This included a warm up jog and an active recovery.



As seen in the attached log, I was running on average 3 times a week, varying depending on what else was on that week. To show an improvement, I ran the Reservoir course (the same used for the Bright P-12 College Cross Country Event) and timed myself. Times are in the table below:

Week number	Time (minutes : seconds)
0 (25/1/2016)	33:51
2 (14/2/2016)	32:47
4 (25/2/2016)	31:13
6 (9/3/2016)	28:26
8 (24/3/2016)	26:54

These timed runs were completed in relatively similar conditions as to avoid extraneous variables. This included completing these runs at a cooler temperature, usually in the evening, not running directly after a big meal and always trying in each one so the results were not affected by other variables except for an improvement in running ability. Over time I also found it easier to run certain sections of the course, and less soreness and fatigue after a run. In terms used in my P.E. class, my VO_2 max increased, therefore meaning there was more oxygen moving around my body, and due to

this less soreness would be felt during and after the runs as the lactic acid was able to be moved away from the muscles quicker.

As shown by these times, my ability in cross country running improved immensely over the two month period. This running shall continue on even since the badge is done, as it is a great way to keep fit and healthy.

QUEEN'S SCOUT - OUTDOOR

For my QS Outdoors I have been on three ski trips during the 2015 ski season, two of them to Mt Hotham and one to Mt Buller.

The first ski trip I went on this season was with my family at Mt Hotham from on the 13th – 17th of July. We left at about 2:30am on Monday morning to get to Mt Hotham at about 7:30am. I then did 5 days of full day ski lessons in level 6 of the Kid's Klub ski school. I also skied before and after ski school, so that each day I skied for an average of 7.5 hours, a total of 37.5 hours over the week. For this week my instructor was Martina, who is an instructor at the Mt Hotham Race Club so we did a lot of carving race turns and short turns on very steep black runs. By the end of the week I had dynamic long turns and powerful short turns.

The second ski trip I did this season was a day trip with my school on the 14th of August. I was asked to go on the Yr 8 ski trip to Mt Buller as a student leader to help the Year 8's learn to ski. We met at school at 3:30am and then got on a bus to Mansfield. Once we got to Mansfield I helped the Year 8's to get their hire gear, particularly with getting boots on a off and labelling their gear. After some breakfast we went up the mountain and all of the Year 8's went into their lessons. During these lessons I went around the mountain with some of the teachers to check out the snow conditions on some of the runs. After their lessons I then got to ski with some of the students and help them with their snowploughs to stop and how to turn for a couple of hours before lunch. After lunch I skied with some of the Year 8's to keep on helping them a bit and then went out to some of the harder runs with a couple of the teachers. We skied for a total of 7 hours before getting on the buses back to Mansfield and then back to school.

The last ski trip I went on this season was a ski trip to Mt Hotham with the Scouts and Venturers from my group. For this trip I also got to help with the planning. I planned out the costs for everything (accommodation, lift tickets, lessons, patrol, resort entry and food), planned out the menu and also made the information flyers for the trip. We left the Scout hall on Friday afternoon and arrived at Mt Hotham at 8:30pm. Once we arrived we went straight to the ski hire shop where I helped the Scouts and Venturers to get all of their gear organised and then showed them over to the lodge we were staying at. Once in the lodge we all got settled into our rooms, had supper and went to bed. The next day I did a full day Kid's Klub lesson (Level 6) and then skied with the Scouts in the afternoon, once again helping them with their turns and such. On the second day I did a half day Kid's Klub lesson and then spent the afternoon in the extreme zone (double black runs) and then in the terrain park, working on my jumps and tricks. That evening the Scouts and Venturers went home but my family stayed up for another day. On the Monday we had fresh powder so there was some amazing snow to ski in. I did another full day Kid's Klub lesson where we went around the mountain looking for the bets powder to ski and worked on our short turns and powder skiing techniques. Over this weekend I skied a total of 21 hours and got really good at skiing in fresh powder on steep black runs, got my sideways slide over a box and also my grab over a jump.

Overall I think that this ski season has been amazing, I have skied a total of about 65.5 hours, gotten much better at my short turns on steep black runs, both on icy snow and in powder, my dynamic long turns are now at race level and I have also gotten more tricks in the terrain park.

Aspect 1.



Between the 23rd-25th of May 2014 I attended a branch run Leadership Course Nagambie in order to fulfil element one of the badge. Participants discussed areas of leadership including management and organisation, delegation and consideration, responsibility, communication, teamwork and co-operation, problem solving and perseverance. These characteristics were explored through speeches prepared delivered by venturer, as well as through

practical activities. The weekend was themed, with each of us being divided into groups which were then put in charge of one of four islands in an archipelago. However, disaster struck often on these islands, forcing us to make sacrifices, be resourceful and take initiative.

Following are brief summaries and definitions of the elements of leadership, sourced from online Sites and furthered with my own knowledge:

Planning: planning is a process which helps you to focus your ideas and decide on the steps you need to take in order to achieve a particular goal. Planning is vital at all levels in leadership. You need to plan your own tasks and time. Senior management will need to plan the goals and aims of the company as a whole.

As the saying goes - 'fail to plan, plan to fail'.

Organisation: Organizational skills can be termed as a set of skills that help you achieve your higher goals in life. These skill sets help you plan, implement the procedures, monitor growth and ultimately achieve your set goals. This can include management physically, such as with papers and resources, with time or mentally with one's assessment of their abilities in relation to a task.

Decision Making: The thought process of selecting a logical choice from the available options. When trying to make a good decision, a person must weigh the positives and negatives of each option, and consider all the alternatives. For effective decision making, a person must be able to forecast the outcome of each option as well, and based on all these items, determine which option is the best for that particular situation

Communication: "Leaders must have an astute clarity of expression, communicating thoughts entirely synchronized with the messages delivered AND received. A leader must have the ability to communicate effectively at every level in your organization."

Delegation: "A senior executive leader must have confidence to delegate work to his or her team and step back - leaders are there to empower others to become leaders and managers themselves."

Co-Operation: "Absolutely essential is the ability to create and maintain trust and respect between team members quickly and effectively. A leader should be able to spot key problems and empower management to iron out any issues."

Aspect 2

Prior to the Leadership Course, I served as Vice Secretary of the Yullaba Venturer Unit. However, I succeeded this role with one of greater importance, requiring me to utilise the skills I had learnt over the weekend.

February- August 2014: During these seven months I served as the Chairman of the Yullaba Venturer Unit. In this role I ran at least four Unit Council Meetings, and undertook significant roles in the running of the unit. This included assuming some organisation of troop activities, communicating to troop members and troop correspondents and forming programmes. This forced me to use delegation skills, communication skills, planning and organisation (especially in the areas of time management as this was a further responsibility in my weekly schedule) and co-operation with members of my unit. **(12 hours of meetings, extended time in organisation and communication)**

FURTHER ENVOLVEMENT:

August 2014- August 2015: For a year following my position as Unit Chairman, I assumed the role of Unit Secretary. This helped me further my skills in management and communication, as well as organisation to document and distribute minutes from over 7 Unit and Region Councils. Over the year I improved my professionalism in this field, learning a valuable life skill which I believe will be highly useful in my adult life.

Queen Scout Expressions - Videography

Over the course of 2014, I worked with both Alpine and Indigo Shires and local FReeZA Crews to film the local North East Skate Park Series which runs heats in Myrtleford, Mount Beauty, Tangambalanga, Yackandandah, Rutherglen, Bright, Beechworth and Chiltern.

I was able to attend all heats of the 2014 series and shoot footage at each one. Over the course of the series my style of filming improved immensely. I was able to frame up my shots better, anticipate what was coming next and steady my shots on the tripod.

All of the equipment used for the film was my own. My gear included a Canon 60D camera, rode microphone, lenses including 18-55mm, 55-250mm, 30mm and 50mm, tripod and follow focus system.



Over the length of the season I had shot 75 gigabytes of footage, mainly of the skating but also some of other aspects of the events such as the music and arts activities, local bands performing and of the MCs during the skate heats.

Editing the film took some time due to Annette (my examiner) and myself not being able to meet up due to her busy work schedule and my school work. However towards the end of 2015 we sat down and she assisted me in editing the footage and also what she wanted to see in it, including things like showcasing a variety of riders, including local shire logos and an even amount of skate board, scooter and BMX where possible. Below is a screenshot of the timeline from the edit, showing all the clips, audio and effects used on the film.



The music track "Catch a Word" was sourced from former local band Bea's Window. Contact was made with members of the band to claim rights to use their original track in our film, however was originally quite tricky as the band broke up in 2012.

In the end a 2 minute 30 second video was produced and published on facebook on the Indigo Shire page. The major purpose of the project was completed, showing an improvement in filming over the series as well as being a great future promotional tool for the skate park series for their upcoming 2016 season.
