Scouting Facts: India



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Scouting started in India in 1909 and for many years several Scout and Guide Associations existed. By 1951 the Associations had merged to form The Bharat Scouts and Guides.

There are three Sections in the Association:

Cub Scouts aged 6 - 10 years Scouts aged 10 - 18 years Rovers aged 18 - 25 years.

The award levels in the Cub Scouts are
Tenderpad, - One Star and Two Star. There are
also five groups of Proficiency badges: 1)
Character 2) Physical Health 3) Handicraft 4)
Service and 5) World Conservation. A special
Golden Arrow award can be earned by a Two Star
Cub Scout who has at least three Proficiency
badges.

In the Scout Section the award levels are Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class. There is a President's Award which is awarded to a Scout who has earned a certain number of Proficiency badges and has also done some service in the community. A First Class Scout may wear different coloured cords after earning a certain number of Proficiency badges, a blue and green cord for six badges, a red and white cord for 12 badges, and a golden cord for having earned 18 badges and the President's Award.

The Rover Scouts have three training levels: Rover Aspirant, Rover in Training and Rover in Service. There is also the President's Rover Award, granted to Rovers who have achieved a certain standard.

The Rover Scouts can also earn Proficiency badges which include World Friendship, Civil Defence and Soil Conservation.

The Association is involved in numerous community development projects which include digging wells, helping in adult literacy campaigns, poultry keeping, sowing, harvesting and organising schools in villages.

To motivate the Scouts to carry out projects in the community, a national competition called "The Prime Minister's Shield" is held. The Prime Minister presents the award to the winning team. Similarly, Upa-Rashtrapati (Vice President) Award has been instituted for the community development work being carried out by the Rovers/Rangers.

As an act of service, the Bharat Scouts and Guides organise a Railway Service Day during which they assist passengers., clear railway stations and supply drinking water for passengers. Disaster Relief is always provided on a massive scale during floods, earthquakes and droughts.
