All around our homes are simple items that we tend to think only have one use.

But, if we take time to examine those items, they can be used in many different ways.

Take the clothes peg for example. Obviously it's used to peg clothes to the clothes line. But what other uses are there of a clothes peg?

Could you use it as a book mark? Could you attach it to your jumper as a reminder to do something? How about using a clothes peg to hold your extra-long shoe laces together?

Let's have fun with clothes pegs. Here are a few uses for the humble clothes peg. Can you think of anymore?

Ten Peg Bowling



Can you remember the last time you went Ten Pin Bowling? The last time I went bowling the balls were so heavy, they wouldn't roll straight and only knocked down 2 or 3 pins! Did the same happen to you? I reckon there was something wrong with the bowling balls and they were all the same.

Here's a chance to achieve that perfect strike.

From your laundry pick out 10 clothes pegs, find yourself a ruler and a long rubber band. Choose different colours if you can.

Set the clothes pegs standing up on the floor or dining table, nice and straight so that they're just like bowling pins.

With your ruler and rubber band walk 4 steps back from your pins and turn around.

There, now you're looking straight down your own bowling alley.

Now, rather than using a ball to knock over the pins you have the ruler and rubber band. Stretch the rubber band on the ruler, take aim and release!

How many clothes pins did you manage to knock over?

As a Patrol or Unit competition, see how many clothes pins a Cub Scout can knock over in a 10-frame game. You can award the championship to the Cub Scout and Patrol with the highest score.

This is your activity, so why not have the Unit Council can set the activity rules?

Peg Dominoes

Let's use pegs to create a domino effect. First, collect as many clothes pegs as you can, the more the better and then a flat surface such as your dining table or the floor. Peg dominoes won't work on carpet.

Next, practise lining the pegs up in a straight line remembering to leave one finger space between each peg. When you have 10 pegs lined up tip one of the end pegs into the other and see what happens. How exciting was that!

Now let's make our peg design a little bit more complicated. Can you stand your pegs in a circle, triangle or square? Have a try and see what happens.

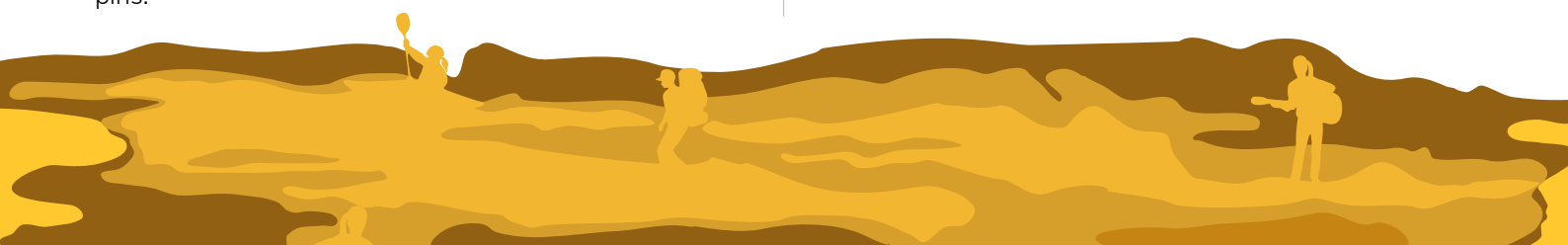
Better still, create your own design, show your Cub Scout friends and ask them to countdown from 5 to 1. 1 is tip off time.

Creative Pegs

The humble clothes peg is a very flexible building material and can be used to create any number of objects ...

Grab as many clothes pegs as you can to create something. Your structure can either be 3 dimensional or a flat design.

Give mum or dad six clothes pegs to hide in your bedroom.

When your Cub Scout Leader counts "1, 2 3", upon "3" see if you can find all six clothes pegs in two minutes.

Peg An Idea

Cub Scouts will participate in a program that is adventurous, fun, challenging and inclusive and the best program ideas are their own.



Ask the Cub Scouts during the week to write things they would like to do, create or learn about at Cub Scouts and using a peg attach it to something in their bedroom. It could be to their curtain, bedhead or blanket. Whatever they choose.

Remember to ask the Cub Scouts to write down which of the 4 Challenge Areas best suits their activity.

Then at your next meeting ask the Cub Scouts to present and discuss the activities they've thought of during the week. Using Post It notes attached the activity ideas to

one of the Challenge Area charts occasionally asking the Cub Scouts whether there is a good balance of activities across the 4 Challenge Areas.

The Unit Council can take those activity ideas for inclusion in another night's program.

Magic Creativity

When it comes to creativity, nothing is more exciting than magic! And this weekend you have the opportunity to watch one of the all-time great magicians, Cosentino!

To whet your magical appetite, try this simple magic trick. You will need one tissue first off.

From this tissue tear off one small piece and tuck it up the left sleeve of your long sleeved top. The sleeve needs to be quite open to later let the piece of tissue drop into your hand.

The rest of the tissue can be thrown away.

Then have someone pull out a fresh tissue from the box and ask them to place it in your left hand.

At the same time have the small piece of tissue that you placed up your left sleeve drop unnoticed into your left hand.

Say to the person that you're now going to tear off a small piece of the tissue they've just given you.

Go through the motions of tearing a piece of the tissue by showing them the small piece that was up your sleeve.

Now place the tissue that seemingly has a tear in the person's hand and say that you will join the pieces back together.

The small piece of tissue you can hide in your hand.

Say some magic words and ask them to unravel the tissue.

Hey presto! The tissue is complete.
