The Australian Rover Plasma Challenge 2020 had one ultimate goal; 500 donations in three months. This year, the lifeblood team designed the challenge to promote more donors to experience a plasma donation.

From the outset, it certainly felt like a challenge to mobilise Rovers across the nation to roll up their sleeves and donate plasma. But as a testament to the passion and service of Rovers Australia wide, the live tallies got off to a roaring start in the first few weeks of August.

As we know, 2020 is a year like no other. Coincidentally, the second lockdown in Victoria became the catalyst for a surge in donations across the state, as donating blood became one of

the four reasons you could leave home. For most people, donating became the most exciting outing of the week!

As the challenge powered on, Units across the country battled it out for first place on the region leaderboard! A special mention must be made to the loyal supporters of the challenge, who helped to book group donations, transporting people to the centres and cheering our donors on every step of the way.

With a big smile and a virtual high-five to all involved, I'm so glad to say that in the final week of October, we hit 500 donations! To capture the final results in a few quick statistics, the challenge involved 272 total donors, 50 of which were new donors. In terms of age, 25% of donors were over 30 showing the wonderful support of ex-Rovers, Rover Advisor's, family and friends throughout the challenge.



Each and every donor and supporter should be incredibly proud of drastically exceeding our plasma challenge goal, with the final tally hitting 533. That equates to 1599 lives saved. You are all bloody lifesavers.

That building has already begun! As a State Leadership Team, we have a list of focal priorities that really emphasise our Scouting passions.

#### Growth

We're aiming for 14 years of growth. We want all Groups to have all five Sections and we want to develop new Groups in the growth corridors. Why? Because we think Scouting helps develop better young people, and that means better communities. and a better Victoria.

#### Youth leading, adult supporting

Youth leading, with adult support, allows our young people to have a voice, to develop and run their program and to learn by doing. At the same time, they are supported and mentored by friendly and wise Leaders. We want more young people to have more leadership opportunities. We're about to deliver on this promise with three new senior leadership roles. These roles will be the first in a series of Youth Commissioners

to be rolled out across all levels of Scouting Leadership in the Victorian Branch.

#### **Program**

Our program has continued to roll out across the State, with the introduction of Participate, Assist, Lead and the Milestones occurring this year, and the last instalments of Outdoor Adventure Skills and Special Interest Areas coming in 2021. We've also had the introduction of Scouts | Terrain; an exciting new platform to track badgework, programming, Patrol activities, and Unit Council. So many new and thrilling developments are happening in this space, so make sure to stay up to date.

#### Being your best self

We would like to better support Leaders to be the best they can be, not only





because it's better for our own health, but also we can be better role models for our young people. This means supporting our Leaders through training, through strategy and through program. We want our Leaders to discover their best selves.

#### AJ 2022

We want to create and deliver an innovative and exciting AJ2022. There is great work happening with site planning, and the Mutant Camels have really made their mark. The Mutant Camels video series is an idea which came from our youth members and was then developed by youth members (with adult support, of course).

#### 2020 - a year to remember

From these initial priorities, we've had some new hurdles to overcome too. With a global pandemic hitting our members and their families hard, we endeavoured to lighten the load any way we could. Our Free Scouting until March 2021 initiative has meant that no Scouting member has needed to give up one of their biggest support systems and social networks during a time when they need it most. Some of the big hits have been the live instructive sessions like our Cook Along and Consentino's Magic School, where viewers can follow along with the host's instructions and learn by doing right there at home, whilst still interacting with their peers right across the state.

We've also held some inspirational question and answer sessions with Olympians and our very own Scout Australia team from the World's Toughest Race; with our youth members facilitating the live interviews and fielding the questions submitted from the audience. To draw on our own internal resources, we've also hosted presentations from some of the teams here at Scouts Victoria; with Adventurous Activities and First Aid holding informative and useful sessions.

Most recently, our Scout Quest adventure culminated in live events from the

RSPCA and Robert Irwin from Australia Zoo! Who doesn't love animals? These events certainly proved popular with our

viewers. It may not have been a normal year of adventure for Scouts Victoria, but we sure do know how to keep it interesting.

## From Scout's Victoria's Report to Victoria

It has been a personal privilege to Chair the Branch Executive Committee this past year. We had no idea it would develop into such a challenging time, with no playbook on what to do next. To witness the energy, skills and time that our Leaders have committed to Scouting this year is humbling.

Into this unheralded time, we welcomed Rod Byrnes as Chief Commissioner and Daniella Taglieri as Deputy Chief Commissioner. Rod and his team have done a sterling job in getting up and running and tackling the big issues strongly and quickly. The Covid-19 pandemic and its impact on Victorian Scouting presented challenges that they and the BEC chose to rapidly respond to. They have used this opportunity to find creative ways to retain and grow our youth membership. All indications are that they have done a sterling job.

The BEC recently discussed its five-year financial plan. This shows how we are challenged by reduced revenue due to Covid-19 and increasing costs of Redress and litigation. It shows how we will tighten areas of expenditure and continue a program of selling underutilised properties to fund new facilities. We remain confident that Scouts Victoria's planning and financial programs have the ability to manage these stresses and to continue to focus on growth.

The Strategic Plan for the next three years of Scouting in Victoria is very close to release. This plan will provide an

opportunity for input and will form the basis upon which we plan, do and review for coming years.

It is likely that Scouts Victoria will make a decision in the next year as to whether we participate in the State Government's Container Deposit Scheme. It appears there is a wide range of options on how Scouting in Victoria might participate in this potentially profitable can and bottle recycling program. This could become a major venture and there will need to be broad input as the options are refined.

Our leadership remains focused on presenting the best possible Scouting program and finding ways to bring Scouting to more youth across all of Victoria. The new program will require the BEC to turn its focus to providing facilities and infrastructure in support. There will be an increased emphasis on the quality and utilisation of our campsites.

The more constrained operating approach will mean that our professional operations, our staff and our IT systems will become key areas of focus. We will look to find ways for these to provide a better service to our members, youth and adult, whilst containing costs.

Government engagement, especially through Executive Manager Jon McGregor, continues to strengthen. Our key Ministers and Departments talk of the resilience we bring to the youth in the State and are in awe of the rapidly rolled out Covid programs.

Litigation and Redress payments continue to feature heavily in our forecasts of expenses. Litigation claims, supported by recent high-profile settlements, are increasing materially in value. We continue to work to ensure that appropriate compensation is made available whilst respecting our survivor members, both past and present.

The staff have worked tirelessly during a difficult year. They have adapted rapidly to the changing work environment.





# Planning for 2021

Be prepared, as someone famous once said.

No one could have been prepared through the turmoil of 2020, but we adapted and coped.

The next challenge is to be prepared for 2021.

It's that time of year when youth members and Leaders in every Group in Victoria should be planning their 2021 program.



This means applying the Plan>Do>Review> process, with support from Patrol Discussion and Youth Leading, Adults Supporting

See the sidebar on Resources.

Here are some thoughts on how to tackle this task, plus some ideas from other Leaders.

There are also some specific thoughts for each Section - Joey Scouts to Rovers.

#### Who: youth

resources.

Scouting today – as it has largely been since Brownsea Island in 1907 – is about youth leading, and adults supporting.

That means that youth members, particularly Patrol Leaders - but also every young voice in your Unit - should be heavily involved in planning your Unit's 2021 program.

It may be worth emphasising to the whole Unit that everyone has a voice in program planning.

Of course, you probably can't have every member of your Unit meeting together to plan next year's program.

It's hard enough with four or five Patrol

Leaders plus a few Leaders.

But it is very useful to begin the program planning at the Patrol level, with short structured exercises led by the Patrol Leader to give everyone a say in what they want to do next year.

The Patrol Discussion schedule will help the PL lead a review of the program cycle just completed and seek activity ideas from the Patrol to take to the Unit Council.

#### Who: Leaders

You might start by reviewing the materials on Challenge Area Brainstorming, and Youth Leading, Adults Supporting. There are links in the sidebar on Resources.

Leaders have many roles in planning – gathering resources, teaching youth members how to run planning meetings, and seeing that tasks are followed through.

It is not the Leaders' role to dominate planning or decide on program, but to listen, answer questions, and offer advice when appropriate.

Straight after the Unit Council it can be useful for the Leaders to meet separately for a brief chat (pizza and a drink?) on who's doing what to help the youth achieve their goals.

#### When

If you've not already started your 2021 planning, now is the time.

It's best done over a few short meetings, rather than one long, boring, exhausting meeting.

One option is for Patrol Leaders and Leaders to go away for a 24-hour camp and alternate 60- or 90-minute planning sessions with fun activities like swimming, games, meals, or a movie.

The goal should be to end the 2020 Scouting year with a largely planned calendar for 2021.

That means broad highlights like camps and other events for the full year but fine detail likely weekly program for the next term.

Fine planning will still be required for many events through the year, but finalising your 2021 program now will

## **Joey Scouts**

Some ideas from the State Joey Scout Council.

- Have a Unit Council and get your Joey Unit excited for the huge year ahead based on their ideas.
- Everything is possible if you manage the risk, so push your boundaries and help make the Unit's ideas come to life.
- Plan a Unit Camp or a Sleepover make it big, memorable and special. Get your Unit talking about it and assisting to plan.
- MESS IS GOOD! Have a messy night with shaving cream, slime and bags of flour.
- Get out of your hall as often as possible run your Unit night in a nearby park.
- Have a campfire with lots of singing. Make sure the Unit helps plan and, of course, sets the fire while learning fire safety.
- Plan a bushwalk or hike with your Unit.
- Small Patrol-based rotational activities work great and give your Patrol Leaders a great chance to Lead.
- Ceremonies should be special. Make sure you plan well ahead for investitures, transitions and presentations and have them Youth-Led wherever practical.
- Get our in your community. Go fishing, Aussie Backyard Bird Count, Tree planting, Rogaining.
- With your Unit, plan and plant a veggie patch or trees at your hall.

## **Cub Scouts**

- Plan an exciting Unit Holiday for term one.
- Aim to have at least two adventurous outdoor activities each term, like a hike in the bush.
- Have an inter-Unit activity with another Unit from your District or Region.
- Catch the train into the city and have lunch on the edge of the Yarra River.
- A movie night with popcorn and ice cream treats.
- A campfire with the Scout Unit with lots of songs and skits.
- Plant some sustainable trees and shrubs around your Scout hall.
- A reverse night where you do everything backwards.
- What can we make with icy poles and rubber bands?
- · Water, water and even more water...

take the stress of Leaders next year, and give families adequate notice of your major events.

#### Where

Many Units choose to meet in their hall or den.

The advantage is that it close to home, useful resources may be at hand, and it's familiar.

The disadvantage is familiarity and distracting – planning a year's program can benefit from a special setting.

One option is to have two or three meetings over a weekend at the home of a Unit member or Leader.

Or to go away for 24 hours to a Scout camp or the holiday home of a member's family.

#### How

There is a range of topics to be considered before you start meeting.

- Who will lead your planning meetings, and who will prepare them for this task
- Who will record your planning meetings (is this the task for a leader so the youth members can focus on discussion?)
- How will you share and promote your program to all your families before the end of the 2020 Scouting year?
- How will you remind all your families in January 2021?
- What resources do you need to have information for your youth members to create a good program?
- Who is looking after food, drink and other catering?
- When will the leaders meet to share their tasks to help support the Unit Council's program?

#### Resources

Some items that may be helpful in giving your youth members ideas for their program include:

- The 2021 <u>Scouts Victoria Program</u> <u>Planner</u>
- Your District program
  - Any major Group events (ARAP, group birthday, family camp, sausage sizzles)

- Recent past programs of your own Unit (don't forget past successes)
- The programs of other Units in your district (steal their best ideas)
- Details of Scouts Victoria's adventurous activities programs
- Dates of Scout performing arts performances (Gang Shows and Showtimes)
- A map of Scouts Victoria campsites (is this the year to try something different?)

#### Special considerations

The Unit's 2021 program is not just about filling the dates.

Every event on the calendar should have purpose.

For the first few weeks of the new year, this may be about having fun and getting the Unit back together after the summer break.

The last meeting of each term may also be fun - a breakup night that is different every term.

But through much of the year, in addition to fun and friendship, Scouts want to learn new skills and try new things.

Not like school, but in practical ways that challenge and extend them.



- Check out the calendar on the <u>explorerscouts.com.au</u> website for your Patrol activities and State events.
- Register early for Patrol activities to ensure you don't miss out.
- Talk to your District Scout Leader and find out what District events are running as well as organise with your District Unit Council any events you want added to the program.
- Jamboree is running in January 2022, so ensure you have planned four nights consecutive camping as well as the other requirements (Pioneer or Milestone 1).





#### **Venturers**

- All Venturers are encouraged to contribute activity ideas and suggestions, and assist the Unit Council put together a first term program cycle including assigning Leads and Assists.
- Have Venturers investigate course dates and have the Venturers book themselves in.
- Discuss what Outdoor Adventure Skills activities interest the Unit, form Project
  Patrols to explore an Outdoor Adventure Skills activity and contact the Activity
  Team to start making plans.
- Plan a Unit Camp or hike to get back outdoors and sign-off Venturer Skills hikes or Outdoor Adventure Skills core skills.
- Reach out to any Scouts that may have aged out and not transitioned to
   Venturers during the virtual Scouting period. Invite the Scouts to outdoor
   activities that showcase Venturer activities as adventurous, fun, challenging
   and inclusive.
- Make sure any awards earned during lockdown are presented, especially any Queen's Scout Awards.



Units are at different stages in implementing the new program with all Scouts expected to have completed the transition to Program Essentials by the end of 2020.

Whether they are well down the path, or relatively new in their transition, an understanding of the new program is essential for all before planning 2021.

We need to ask ourselves: does our program provide opportunities for our youth members to achieve against the structure of the new program.

Remember, Program Essentials is a Scouts core Scouting experience and it's expected that all Scouts will achieve their Program Essentials Milestones regardless of their interest in exploring other aspects of the program such as achieving their peak award.

#### 2. AJ 2022

For the Scout Section – and possibly for other members of the Group including Leaders, Venturers and Rovers – the Jamboree in January 2022 will provide a purpose for some of your 2021 program.

Scouts will require to have achieved certain levels in the award scheme, and to have met the camping requirement before the Jamboree.

In addition to personal fundraising, most groups will have a fundraising program to benefit all members attending AJ 2022.

There are some ideas on the AJ 2022 fundraising posters.

Remember, is better to run a few large fundraisers than exhaust everybody with too many small events.

Here are some more planning ideas for each Section from other Leaders.



## **Rover Scouts**

Rover Scouts are most engaged and activities prove to be most successful when they are planned by the Rovers themselves.

Activities should be hands on and engaging, meeting the interests of the Unit. And this will look different for every Unit as there will be different interests.

All Rovers should be given the opportunity to participate, assist and lead in activities that interest them.

#### Tips for Planning

- Write down all of the challenge areas and get the Unit to provide ideas of activities that fit into the Challenge areas.
- Ensure your program includes the Challenge areas covered and who is leading and assisting to each activity.

Activities that should be in your program:

- Inter-Section activities (including linking activities with Venturers).
- Inter-Unit activities (e.g. Region/State events, activities with other local Units).
- Activities that cover all four challenge areas.
- Outdoor activities and adventures.

## **Group Leader**

Here are three ideas for getting your Group off to a great start in 2021

#### Season launch

One Group, for many years, has begun each new year with a family barbecue. A social gathering for parents, games for children, and often a large-scale water fight.

But the highlight is 5-8 minutes of formality: the Group Leader might introduce an older youth member to talk about coming



whole Group, then a few words from the Group Chairman about the Committee's fundraising, maintenance and other projects for the year ahead, and finally another youth member to say thanks to Leaders and parents in anticipation of the

#### A night out for the Committee

Christmas is too busy, so some Groups begin the year with a dinner for the key adults in the Group. Leaders and Committee members might pay for their own meals, while the Group provides the drinks. A barbecue at someone's home, or a cheap night at a local restaurant.

#### LeaderBuild

The LeaderBuild presentation should be run annually to introduce new parents to the full breadth of Scouting, and invite their participation as Leaders (or Adult Helpers or Committee members).

After the broken year that was 2020, there may be many new parents in your Group who would benefit from a well-run 35-minute LeaderBuild presentation.

Some Groups even ran LeaderBuild successfully online during lockdown. 1st Nunawading recruited seven new Leaders, four Adult Helpers, and one Committee member from a Zoom presentation by an experienced presenter. (A number of Groups have used external presenters from other Groups.)

# Abseiling Team

Take a deep breath and make that brave first step over the edge. Abseiling is a thrilling way to explore nature, supported by a rope as you walk your way down a vertical tower, cliff or rock face.

We prepare you for the adventure with the best practical and technical training available, and we're committed to risk management and safety.

Your confidence will build with each step, as you feel secure with your training and equipment, and you start to feel the pride of what you're achieving.

The objective of the State Abseiling Team is to promote abseiling to our youth members and to ensure that all persons conducting these activities do so with the best technical and practical skills and training available.

The Team is committed to providing abseiling activities accessible to all youth sections and supporting leaders in Victoria. Standards and procedures for abseiling within Scouting in Victoria are set and monitored by the State Abseiling Team. The team maintains a high safety standard through the application of effective risk assessment and management procedures.

The State Abseiling Team provides appropriately qualified Activity Leaders and Leaders in Charge of activities that are booked and accessed through either the activity calendar or by making a

private booking.

seeking approval from Group Leaders for outdoor activities.

The State Abseiling Team is running a new set of activities for youth members. The program calendar is updated continuously and is available <a href="here">here</a>. Activities are held over weekends at a variety of locations around Victoria. There are activities for all Sections from Joey Scouts to Rover Scouts throughout the calendar year, with activities being targeted toward particular Sections, depending on the site used. Please check when booking whether the weekend is suitable for your youth Section.

The State Abseiling Team adapted its calendar to include the stages of OAS each activity is aimed at. When booking private events please discuss with us what stage everyone is at and whether we can modify the event to include activities that suits participants needs to help them with their OAS stage.

Section Leaders wishing to become involved in abseiling are welcome to become trained as Leaders thus allowing them to make more abseiling activities available to their youth members.



There are a number of satellite teams that operate under the auspices of the State Team, to conduct local abseiling activities for youth members and Leaders. They can call upon the State Team (and vice versa) for support as and when necessary. The teams, where qualified, will also provide introductory training for anyone interested in progressing to be formally qualified under the State Abseiling Team umbrella.

Abseiling with Scouts is all about fun and adventure, but there are even greater rewards as well.

Formal qualifications as an abseiling instructor are available, with Level 1 and Level 2 courses running throughout the year allowing for people to apply for Abseiling skillsets from Certificate II or III in Outdoor Recreation.

Take in some amazing scenery, while testing your strength, agility and balance. Your success is literally in your own hands (and toes) as you select grips to climb up, down or across rock formations.

Rock climbing is physically and mentally demanding and it's about to enjoy a new popularity thanks to the sport's inclusion the 2020 Olympics.

You can practise your techniques and build your skills indoors, before taking on the challenges of nature. Or you can start in the great outdoors straight away. Whichever way you choose, it's important to have the right equipment, the right training and the right people around to make it happen safely.

The Outdoor Activities Skills allows all youth to attain skills in Vertical Activities, from a young Joey Scout to an adult Leader.

There are nine levels of Vertical Skills in our program that can be obtained and whilst the Branch Rock Climbing Team predominantly run outdoor climbing activities focused on level 5 and above.

we also offer training and advice for all Section Leaders for levels 1-4

There are many different ways to tackle a rock face. We mostly work with Top Rope Climbing, either the northern Grampians/ Arapiles or Mt Macedon. It's a similar method to climbing in gyms, but the view is much better when you get to the top.

In Top Roping climbs, the rope is always anchored above the climber. Any fall would only be a short distance, quickly stopped by the rope. It's ideal for beginners because they can concentrate on technique and enjoy progress without too much fear of falling. Advanced climbers also turn to Top Roping when they want to develop new techniques or work on their endurance.

Top Rope Climbing is open for Scouts, Venturers, Rovers and Leaders (Cubs linking to Scouts are also accepted). Climbs are available for all experience levels, from the most nervous first timer

> to gifted climbers. It's all about challenging the participants to gain new skills and to achieve more than they expected.

In order to maintain the quality of the rock-climbing experience, we have to limit the number of participants at top rope activities (15 Participants).

# The Great Victorian **Online Camp 2020**

The COVID-19 pandemic has been a difficult and challenging time for most of us, and Scouting has been no different. We have had to adapt and take our programs online.

I was lucky to be a part of an online camp run by Scouts ACT, called Cubornet. This was such an enjoyable experience for the Cubs that I wanted to replicate it in Victoria.

The initial push for a Victorian online camp was for Cubs only, but had no

traction. A second attempt was for it to be an all Section camp for the 1st Seymour Scout Group.

From here, the idea was shared within Tilba Tilba District, and then Plenty Valley Region. Support to spread the word of this online camp was also provided by commissioners. Finally, it was promulgated on the Be Informed newsletter.

I have heard that Leaders and Cubs had the same idea, so you never know what you could do with like-minded people unless you give it a go.

The initial aim was to find those likeminded Leaders who would be willing to run activities. Luckily this was not a problem as many proactive Leaders were willing to contribute to a good cause. Information was sent out to these and many other leaders.

The program was filled quickly, as Leaders stepped forward with activities they wanted to run over a 30 to 40 minute program. Fortunately there was a great variety of activities, ranging from traditional Scouting skill such as navigation, first aid, cooking through

to the creative such as Lego, magic and making ice-cream.

The program was a perfect balance, including a variety of simpler activities that required less equipment and were run a short time after the start of the other activities in case there were problems with Zoom.

This online camp had a plan from the get-go, but was flexible enough to adapt to the many good ideas floated by Leaders. For example, changing the date of the camp to the middle of the school holidays so that everyone would have a break from Zoom, how we managed information on Facebook, a different design for a parents poll, using Try Booking for badge sales, having an indoor fort challenge and creating a flyer for parents.

#### Some tips we learnt from our online camp:

- Have a plan for getting information out there, consider a communications role, and lean on your Scout friends in higher places.
- Select a proportion of activities that are traditional Scouting and others that are creative to achieve a good balance and ensure all age groups are catered for.
- Be flexible, and be open to better ideas. There are plenty out there.
- Facebook was great as a means for parents to share photos of what their Scouts were doing, so that Leaders and fellow parents could see what was happening on the other side of the screen.
- Posting PDFs on Google Drive was better than a PDF straight into Facebook. But, links posted as comments were better than Google Drive links.
- Posting links just before the commencement of activities provided a degree of protection, as they are less likely to be disseminated to third-parties.
- The ideal is a website that only Scout parents can enter using the Scout's registration number, a means to disseminate Zoom links that all parents can receive, and Facebook to share feedback from the camp.
- During the campfire, all Scouts were muted to prevent lag and so all Scouts could hear the Leader. The Leader singing was also spotlighted so everyone could watch the actions for each song.
- Chat was not used unless Scouts were assigned a task. So it was useful to ask questions and get them to put the answers in chat - that reduced spam to almost
- It was suggested that using the file section of Facebook for programs, timetables, and Zoom logins would be ideal so they don't get lost in the general chat of the site.

Choosing how to communicate was straight-forward. Without access to a technical team, it was decided to use Facebook. Everyone has access to this platform, but it was discovered that not everyone chooses to use it. Even then, not everyone who accessed Facebook could open all the information that was posted.

When using Facebook, even as a private group, we had to make sure that only Scout parents were entered. This was achieved by only Leaders entering Scout parents and then confirming what Scout Group each parent was affiliated with. Further, Scouts attending activities were in uniform with the camera on.

Badges are much loved in the Scouting community. A graphic artist was engaged and provided an excellent logo. It was decided that a traditional badge would be better, and so a fun design was created, showing a campfire in a lounge room with a shocked Leader in a monitor.

We used Zoom as our video conferencing service. It has great functionality, and many people are using it for their Scout meetings. We checked to see if any Leaders weren't using it and needed tuition but everyone was good to go. No parents reported having issues once they were able to access the Zoom link, and got into the activity.

All the activities that I logged in to have a look were very well ran. The Leaders were friendly, knowledgeable and passionate. Some had historical notes, interesting information, videos, jokes, provided opportunities for Scouts to provide feedback, and all provided opportunities to learn.

Given how many Scouts were registered, it was decided to run two campfires. The first was for Joeys and young Cubs and the second was for the rest. We had three Leaders sharing the singing, with one Leader including his wife and son.

What did some parents think of The Great Victorian Online Camp? As with all Scouting activities, we have Plan-Do-Review. For the review part we asked parents to provide feedback on Facebook. The responses were overwhelmingly positive. Many provided lessons which have been included in the article. Here are some more responses.

"I loved how kids from all over Victoria could be involved in a bigger experience then their local camps."

"Thanks for organising the event, our household had an awesome time. I think the range of activities was awesome, with something for everyone for each time slot."

"Absolutely fantastic. We had a ball in our house participating over the weekend. The links worked well, we really appreciated that the resources were shared early enough to print out. Really great to see a diverse group of scouts from right across the state join in. Activities did a great job at including all age groups."

"Thank you so much to all involved. It was thoroughly enjoyed by our Scout, who wasn't sure about it beforehand. Had a fabulous weekend. Super well organised and smooth sailing (from our end!)."

"A fantastic, well organized and run event, everyone was so enthusiastic. My kids weren't too sure about it beforehand (Zoom fatigue), but they thoroughly enjoyed every session."

"Feedback wise it would be great to do this every year it opens up scouting to a range of kids that struggle with normal camps. Some kids have difficulties with social and anxiety issues and this allows them to be in there comfort zone while joining in."

"Was wondering if in future years we do this and Cubs could meet at their hall and do as group from there as well as individuals from home."

"Scouting really has helped us all get through this crazy lockdown business."

"They did separate activities then share their experience to each other. It was a great bonding time for them too. And we, as parents absolutely love it as well, seeing them doing activities and helping each other out."

About 432 Scouts registered for this online camp, from 92 different Groups. Not all the Scouts attended all the sessions. 21% were Joeys, 48% Cubs, 29% Scouts and 2% Venturers. We averaged 370 participants for each session of four concurrent activities. A total of 24 activities were run by 34 Leaders. The most popular activity was making icecream with 198 participants (not a shock...).

A massive thank you to all the Leaders who contributed to this online camp. Most ran or assisted with activities, some were members of a committee of sorts, many contributed

> ideas, and one became a Facebook mentor for parents. Well done to you all.

> What of the future? A few Leaders have suggested that this could become an annual event, even when we are face




